

President's Men. The result



Intrigued? Ashley Tongret, a regular Carrico/Fort Thomas patron and Cincinnati Opera director of public relations, offers six reasons you should try opera. Take it away, Ashley:

- 1. Just like chocolate mousse, you don't know whether or not you'll like it until you try it.
- 2. Opera is for everyone. Wear a ball gown, or jeans, or both!
- 3. You don't need to come prepared, or know any foreign languages. The story is in your program, and the words are projected in English above the stage as the words are sung.
- 4. Experiencing opera is a lot like watching a movie being performed right in front of you.
- 5. Yes, there's music most of the time, but don't let that scare you: There's music during most of *Star Wars*, too! Just as in movies, music helps tell the story and prompts how you should feel about a certain character or during a particular scene.
- 6. Opera singers don't use amplification. Unlike Broadway, opera singers are specially trained so their voices reach every part of the theater without microphones or speakers.



In addition, preschoolers and young children can meet Elephant & Piggie, enjoy face painters and balloons and each child will get a free book while supplies last. In short, the Early Literacy Fair is a great place to make reading fun for your child.

Ms. Pryse knows about that. She has volunteered the past two years at Lincoln Elementary as a reading coach with One to One, a partnership of local schools and the Northern Kentucky Education Council. She worked with a first-grade girl last year and a different first-grade girl this year. She and her pupil read to each other, play sight word games and bond.

In March, the first-grader so enjoyed a leprechaun book, she had Ms. Pryse read it twice. "Every time she sees me, I get a big hug," Ms. Pryse said. "She's very comfortable with me now."

Ms. Pryse's preparation as a coach starts at

the Library. "The Fort Thomas Library has been wonderful in helping me select books and helping me with advice if I have a problem," she said.

Ms. Pryse began volunteering on the recommendation of her son-in-law, a retired teacher, and hasn't looked back." I love to do it," she said. "I also give the 'grandmother' approach to a child. I remember my grandmother and she was very special."

One to One coaching for the school year ended in April, but Ms. Pryse is looking forward to next school year where another pupil will need a little encouragement and a lot of heart. "You know what? # Library seeks applicants for 2 positions on board

The Library is seeking applications for two openings on its Board of Trustees. These are non-paid, voluntary positions. Applications will be accepted through May 31, and interviews will be conducted in June. Terms for the new board members begin Oct. 1, 2016.

Members of the Library's board of trustees serve four-year terms. By law, the board must maintain a balanced geographical representation of all areas of the county. In

keeping with that requirement, the Board is seeking one member to represent Newport, Bellevue, Dayton,

those immediate areas. A will be selected to represent

Fort Thomas or those immediate areas. A second person will be selected to represent southern Campbell County. In addition, the board seeks to develop an array of talented members with complementary skills. All candidates will be considered.

Generally, the positions demand a maximum of four hours a month that include one monthly meeting; continuing education opportunities; and interacting with staff and the public at the branches. Present board members are Cathy Howard, Steven Trumbo, Paul Johnson, Christie Fillhardt and Carla Landon. The openings are for Ms. Howard's and Mr. Johnson's expired terms. Both are eligible to serve a second four-year term.
