Zane, pictured at right, recently became the latest member of the 1000 Books Before Kindergarten club.

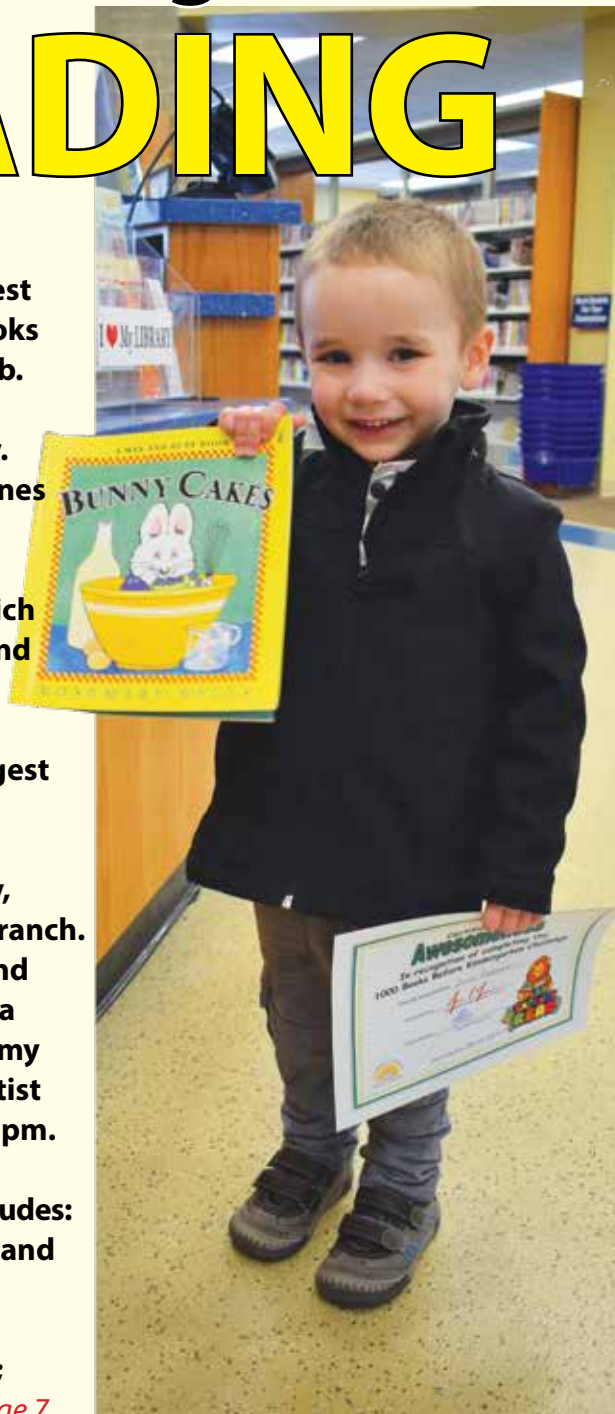
Zane's in good company. More and more young ones are getting a head start on the road to success through the Library, which offers many programs and outreach efforts.

Kingsbridge Series by Ken Follett.

These books aren't difficult to read; they just have a lot of pages. ***Kingsbridge Series*** is about building cathedrals in the 1300s. It's a remarkable look at how these massive structures were built with primitive tools and methods, told through the lives of very interesting characters. The first book is ***Pillars of the Earth*** (1989) and the second, which continues from about where the first one leaves off, is ***World Without End*** (2007). The books follow a generation of families. Now the word is out that Follett has penned a third book in the series. ***A Column of Fire*** is expected to be released in September 2017.

Classic pop infused with elements of classical style creates a dramatic sound, one heard from groups such as The Beatles, the Beach Boys and Electric Light Orchestra. Co-curators CCO acting concertmaster Amy Kiradjieff and rock guitarist Roger Klug will host a mixed CCO string and woodwind ensemble for a colorful evening of wildly familiar and off-the-beaten-path pop music selections.

Regional History Series continues sports theme

To complement the Smithsonian Traveling Exhibit this month (details at right), this year's Regional History Series pays tribute to Newport's sports history. The first two chapters of the series will be 7 pm Thursdays, May 4 and 18.

On May 4, Dr. James Claypool will set the stage for the 143rd running of the Kentucky Derby and share personal reflections of his longtime friendship with former Newport resident and acclaimed jockey Eddie Arcaro, the only rider to be aboard two Triple Crown champions. Dr. Claypool is a Professor Emeritus of History, Northern Kentucky University.

On May 18, local historians Ted Harris, Robert Ingguls and Larry Miles will share an overview of the history of Newport's Southgate Street School, the only school for African American children in Campbell County from 1866 until the integration of schools in 1955.
