

What you need to know about new ebook rules

Recent changes to how all libraries purchase digital items from major publishers will hinder our ability to provide new eBook bestsellers for our patrons.

Major publishers, including Hachette Book Group, Penguin Random House and Simon &

Schuster have recently implemented lending policies that require public libraries to repurchase eBooks and eAudiobooks every two years, with repurchase rates double the retail price.



Starting Nov. 1, Macmillan Publishers, another major publisher, plans to restrict libraries from purchasing more than one copy of each new eBook for eight weeks after its release. After the eight weeks, libraries may purchase additional copies for around \$60 per copy. Libraries must repurchase the additional copies every two years.

Macmillan's new policy means that Kentucky Libraries Unbound, the consortium used by us and 105 other Kentucky libraries, will only be able to purchase one copy of a popular title for the first eight weeks after the eBook's release. The increased cost of purchasing digital items, and the need to repurchase every two years, means that libraries will be spending more money but purchasing fewer titles.

"We're disappointed the publishing industry has taken this approach," said library director J.C. Morgan. "Libraries, authors and publishers have always supported one another. There's no doubt this will have a negative impact on our patrons."





Circle of Giving

Giving. It's going around. From famous authors to loving grandparents to you. This is especially true this month as the library's fifth annual Drop Your Drawers campaign kicks off, but it's just the starting point of the circle of giving we're celebrating.

DROP YOUR DRAWERS

We know Drop Your Drawers makes a tremendous difference for children in Campbell County elementary schools. The library collects new packages of boys' and girls' underwear – and this year we're also collecting socks – to distribute to 14 public elementary schools in Campbell County to keep children in the classroom. The need is great. Family Resource Centers give out 30-100 pair of emergency underwear every month. Our goal is again 7,000 pair of underwear and socks. Packages can be dropped off at all four branches from Friday, Nov. 1 through Tuesday, Dec. 31.



The giving spirit behind Drop Your Drawers also inspired children's book author **Dav Pilkey (left)**. Mr. Pilkey generously allowed us to use his **Captain Underpants** character to promote Drop Your Drawers. He also donated autographed copies of his books along with a monetary contribution to the library. This has directly benefitted two different programs.

In September, the library and all the local school districts introduced **Dolly Parton's Imagination Library: Campbell County** in which residents can register their young ones to receive a free book in the mail each month until age 5. **The Dolly Parton Foundation** provides costs for printing the books; the library and the school districts pay to have the books delivered. Mr. Pilkey's donation to the library was used as seed money to start the program. As of early October, about 1,800 young ones in the county have been registered. Mr. Pilkey, though, isn't the only donor to this worthy program. Among other donors are **Nancy and Randy Wright** (right) of Alexandria. The couple have been donating to Imagination Library since their grandson Mark passed away in 2017 at age 19 months. "Mark loved books and loved to be read to," Mrs. Wright recalled. "He would bring his favorite book to you, climb up in your lap and he was ready for a story." Since that time, Mark's little brother, Evan, also passed away at only four months. They both had suffered from a genetic heart disease of which the family had been unaware. The family had previously donated to Imagination Library in Jefferson County but switched to Campb


