The Origins of the Story!

"Jack and the Beanstalk" is a widely known English fairy tale that's been retold for nearly 300 years, but according to researchers, the story originated more than FIVE THOUSAND YEARS AGO, based on a wide-spread story discovered by folklorists translated as "The Boy Who Stole Ogre's Treasure". The English version of the story first appeared as "The Story of Jack Spriggins and the Enchanted Bean" in 1734. "Jack and the Beanstalk" is the best known of the "Jack tales", a series of stories featuring the archetypal Cornish and English hero and stock character Jack.

SO MANY VERSIONS!

Walt Disney made a short animation of the Jack and the Beanstalk story in 1922, and a separate adaptation titled Mickey and the Beanstalk in 1947 as part of Fun and Fancy Free. This adaptation of the story put Mickey Mouse in the role of Jack, accompanied by Donald Duck and Goofy. Walt Disney Animation Studios had wanted to do another adaptation of the fairy tale called Gigantic. Tangled director Nathan Greno was to direct and it was set to be released in late 2020, however, it was reported on October 10, 2017, that the studio had made the decision to cancel the film after struggling creatively with it.



In 2013, Warner Bros. released a film directed by Bryan Singer and starred Nicholas Hoult as Jack, titled Jack the Giant Slayer. In this tale, Jack climbs the



beanstalk to save a princess.

In the 1986, Stephen Sondheim and James Lapine wrote the musical Into the Woods, and the 2014 film of the same name, one of the main characters, Jack climbs a beanstalk, much like in the original version. He acquires a golden harp, a hen that lays golden eggs, and several gold pieces, familiar items that appear in most versions of the story. The story goes on as it does in the original fairy tale, but continues afterwards showing what happens after you get your happy ending. In this adaptation, the giant's vengeful wife attacks the kingdom to find Jack and take revenge for her husband.

All Grade Levels Activity

There have been countless variations of the "Jack and the Beanstalk" story as it has been told and retold over time. As Jacqueline says in the variation of the story she tells in the show:

"One person tells it this way, another person tells it that way, and before you know it, everybody's telling the same story a different way"



THE ONE-WORD STORYTELLER GAME

To illustrate this concept, create a simple story by adding just one word at a time.

Example:

Student 1: "Once"

Student 2: "Upon"

Student 3: "A"

Student 4:"Time"

Student 1: "There"

Student 2: "Was"

Student 3: "A"

Student 4: "Giant"

- 1. Have students form a line, circle, or stay seated at their desk. This activity can be done with the entire class or in smaller groups.
- 2. Each student only gets to add one word to the story when it is their turn.
- 3. The first student will start the story off with one word. Then, the person next to them will add on another word. You can go around the room as many times as you want to create your very own version of the story.
- 4. Have one student or the teacher write down the story that is created and then read it out loud once it is finished.
- 5. It is important to pick a topic before beginning this activity. Start with your own retelling of a Jack and the Beanstalk tale but add your own twists to it. Maybe Jack didn't get magic beans, maybe in your story he received 3 magic french fries!\
