Reserve a Study Room

Crack open your textbooks, grab your study partners and prepare your backpack—school is back in session. The library can help you throughout the school year not only with our free public Wi-Fi, computer access and large collection of materials but also with study rooms at each branch.

Study rooms can be reserved in two-hour blocks. If you are requesting a room within 72

Kentucky's Former State Librarian Wayne Onkst on Bookmobiles, continued from the cover

Kentucky is home to the largest fleet of bookmobiles in the United States, a title the Commonwealth has claimed for decades, according to data from the American Library Association. The Bluegrass State's relationship with these vans—mobile walkon libraries that allow patrons to check out materials—dates back to World War II. It's a history that Wayne Onkst, former state librarian, knows well.

Hear Onkst discuss the subject, as well as show historic images, at 7 pm Thursday, Aug. 18 as part of our Spotlight Series at the Newport Branch.

"Today we take libraries and books for granted. We have books all around us," Onkst says. "We can go to the library anytime we want. Here in Kentucky, we have beautiful libraries with great collections and services. Not too long ago, that simply was not the case."

Post-World War II, Onkst explains, state officials began determining what communities needed in order to progress. They found that library services were barely

existent. In fact, Onkst cites that 80 percent of the state's rural population had no service at all, making Kentucky among the worst in the country.

In the late 1940s, Louisville philanthropist Mary Belknap Gray was in search of a cause to spend her time and financial resources after becoming widowed. She saw an article about a group in Eastern Kentucky who began a service in which they used a car to deliver books to children in remote rural areas.

"She picked up that idea. She bought a surplus army ambulance that had been used in World War II and had it retrofitted, filled it full of books and offered it to any county that would take it in the state," Onkst says, later adding that the initiative was wildly popular.

Over the next 6 to 8 years, she bought seven more vehicles. The Friends of Kentucky Libraries saw the need and interest for bookmobiles and began aiming to provide two vehicles a year for systems statewide. Enter the bookmobile campaign of 1954. Chaired by Mrs. Barry Bingham, the project raised enough funds to purchase 84 bookmobiles for libraries across Kentucky. Eleven were added the following year.

"And that's basically how library service in the state started,"

Onkst said. "It's a really fascinating story because the impetus came not from librarians but from business people and philanthropists who saw the need."

Onkst has spent his whole career working in libraries. Early on, Onkst even drove a bookmobile for Kenton County Public Library. He went on to serve in various roles, most notably as Kentucky's state librarian from 2006 until his retirement in 2015.

Decades later, bookmobiles still serve a vital purpose in our communities, even as both communities and libraries—and access to transportation and technology— have evolved. As Onkst points out, not everyone can easily get to the physical library, even now.

Make sure to register for Onkst's talk as well as check out the rest of Spotlight Series. Mirsada Kadiric, author of *I Am a Refugee: Finding Home Again in America* will kick off the series on Aug. 11 by telling her story of journeying from Bosnia to Kentucky. *Enquirer* sports journalist Paul Daughtery rounds the lineup out on Aug. 25 by retelling his favorite career moments.
