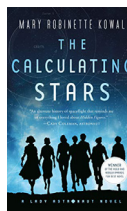
FAVORITE BOOKS FEATURING WOMEN IN STEAM

If you're in need of internet, printer or computer access, the library has you covered.

Reserve a computer by calling the branch of your choice or online at www.cc-pl.org/computers-internet. Each branch provides free access to computers with internet. All

you need is a library card and PIN. There are 61 desktop and laptop computers available across all four branches.

Want to bring your own laptop to study, browse or work remotely? All branches also provide free Wi-Fi in all public areas. No password is required!

Printing is Easy at the Library

You can send a printing request from the comfort of your own home to later pick up

at the branch of your choice by sending an email titled "Print Job" with the documents attached. When you arrive at the branch, head to the information services desk to let them know. They'll print the items and then you pay; black and white pages are 10 cents and color pages are 30 cents.

SPRING IS IN THE AIR— AND SO IS STEAM.

Read on for the library's STEAM Month lineup, which includes programs and activities throughout March for all ages and interests.

Spread across all branches and age groups, patrons can enjoy over 15 STEAM-related programs and activities this March. Standing for Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Math, activities include everything from virtual reality gaming to Pi Day celebrations to learning how to build a computer and flower pounding art.

Plan your STEAM Month by reading a few of the highlights below and marking your calendar for other programs listed throughout the newsletter.

FAMILY STEAM NIGHT

Celebrate all-things-STEAM at the Carrico/ Fort Thomas Branch. Held 6-8 pm Saturday, March 25, the festival features local

presenters championing various STEAM careers, interests and topics.

Presenters include the Cincinnati Observatory, Foundation for Ohio River Education, Cincinnati Museum Center, Fort Thomas Forest Conservancy, Greater Cincinnati Civic Garden Center, Campbell County Emergency Management, Tallant Music Studio, Northern Kentucky University Costume Shop, Chris Rust of CR Carving, Linda Fritz of Sun Sugar Farms, Junior Achievement of OKI, Kentucky Engineering Exposure Network and the Taft Museum of Art.

Don't forget to cast your vote for the Creator Competition! Make LEGO or duct tape creations at home and bring them to the Carrico/Fort Thomas Branch by 5 pm on March 20 to participate. Creations will be displayed and voted on for Best Utility and Best Art across four age groups (adult, teen, school age, young ones) at Family STEAM Night, where the winners will be announced. Winners receive a gift card.

No registration is required for either event. Soak up knowledge, get creative and have fun with the whole family.

STEAM READING CHALLENGE

Crack open a STEAM-related book this month for the chance to score a prize. Sign up for STEAM Reading Challenge on Beanstack, a website and app that allows users to track reading. Mark each science, technology, engineering, art and math related book read and receive one entry per category toward a prize.

1,000 Books Before Kindergarten



Aimed at children ages newborn to five, 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten encourages an interest in reading from a young age. For every 100 books read to them, children receive a prize and a sticker. Reach 1,000 and receive a certificate and a free book!

Want to learn more? Check out this Q&A with Stacey Venneman, the early literacy outreach librarian, where she discusses 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten, how it gets children excited about reading and more with Mackenzie Manley, public relations coordinator.

Sign up for free by visiting any branch and asking for a paper log or track progress via the Beanstack app.

Manley: *If you had to give an "elevator pitch" for 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten, what would it be?*

Venneman: One of the best ways to help your child to develop important skills that will lead to success in many

aspects of their life is to read, read, read together! It supports school readiness, the development of social-emotional skills, and a lifelong love of reading. Reading together also helps strengthen your bond by sharing this time.

Manley: *How do children react when they reach the final goal?*

Venneman: It's amazing to see the pride kids take in reaching this goal! They look like they feel accomplished, and they love receiving their Certificate of Awesomeness and a free book they choose on their own.

Manley: *How does this program help children build their early literacy skills?*

Venneman: Before learning how to read and write, children need to know six different early literacy skills – a motivation to read, print awareness, letter knowledge, vocabulary, hearing and understanding the small sounds in words, and narrative skills. 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten

encourages families to share books with children throughout their pre-kindergarten years to naturally develop these skills!

Manley: *Do you find that 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten is successful in getting participants interested in reading?*

Venneman: When we talk about this program, we like to say it's a marathon, not a sprint. Our goal is not to force it, but to encourage families to try and make a habit of sharing books. Even if we have kids participating here and there and not necessarily getting to the 1,000 mark, we want to celebrate their accomplishment of making time to read. One of my favorite things to track that shows just how much this program encourages young readers is the number of books that have been read throughout the program by all the kids participating. This past year alone this program has seen kids read 30,400 books!


