Letter From Our Director Chantelle Phillips

As summer begins to wind down and schools prepare to welcome students back, it's time to consider how best to keep our children safe while they are out and about in the world.

First, the library functions as a safe place for youth by partnering with the Brighton Center's Project Safe Place. If a young person lets us know they need help or do not feel safe, we move them to a quiet area of the library and call the Brighton Center to ask for a Safe Place staff member to come to our branch to meet with the youth. You may read more about Brighton Center's Project Safe Place on their website, brightoncenter.com, under the "What We Do" page.

Second, Kentucky offers a tip line for reporting unsafe situations in school (e.g., bullying, weapons, drugs or alcohol, etc.). A student, parent or community member may report a concern by calling the Tip Line at (866) 393-6659 or by completing an online form found at safeschools.ky.gov. The site provides access to instructional videos on how the tip line works for both elementary and secondary students, which makes it easier to have this conversation at home.

Additionally, in 1998, through House Bill 330, the Kentucky Center for School Safety was established, which provides guidance, training and resources to schools throughout the Commonwealth. Under the guidance of a fifteen-member board of directors, whom the governor appoints, the Center for School Safety serves as the central point for data analysis, research and dissemination of information about successful school safety programs. The Center also provides a wealth of information on topics from bus safety to mental health resources to internet safety. Their website even organizes its resources by the role a person plays in relationship to a school: family resource center director, food service director, parent, principal, school counselor and student, etc. At their site, kycss.org, you will also find a link to on-demand training videos that provide guidance for parents as they navigate the ever-changing world of raising kids. There's even a training specific to grandparents raising grandchildren.

Please spend some time reviewing the resources on these websites as you prepare for the new school year. I want to thank you all for spending the summer with us. We look forward to serving our families during the school year by providing educational programs and resources to make the year a success!

This Year's Spotlight Series Brings Exciting State and Local History Presentations

This August, Spotlight Series will feature familiar friends and fresh faces as we learn about different aspects of the history of Kentucky and Cincinnati.

AUG. 7: BENEFACTORS OF POSTERITY WITH DANIEL GIFFORD

The series kicks off with a presentation from Daniel Gifford, author and public historian, on his new book, *Benefactors of Posterity: The Founding Era of the Filson Historical Society 1884-1899.* The Filson Historical Society, based in Louisville, Kentucky, dedicates a variety of resources to enhance adult education through the preservation of the significant history and culture of the Kentucky and Ohio Valley area. Named after Kentucky's first historian, this longstanding society takes history seriously with collections of original manuscripts, letters, diaries, photographs, architectural records and rare imprints.

Gifford's book and presentation will not only discuss the accomplishments of the Filson Historical Society throughout its 140 years of work, but will also recognize how systemic racism and Jim Crow culture have shaped some of the society's decisions throughout its lifecycle.

AUG. 14: HISTORY OF TRAINS IN KENTUCKY WITH BOB HAMILTON

All aboard Bob Hamilton's train to learn more about the history of trains in Kentucky! He is joining us from the La Grange Railroad Museum and Learning Center, an organization that is fully staffed by volunteers and one that offers a variety of educational experiences for all ages. The museum features railroad exhibits, model railroads, vintage train cars and a 1914 train station.

Hamilton's presentation will also include video footage and a selection of museum artifacts.

AUG. 21: THE UNKNOWN LEGEND OF THE CINCINNATI STRANGLER

J.T. Townsend is returning to the library to present his research on one of the important

junctures of Cincinnati's past, Cincinnati's 1966 serial killer. The Queen City is well known for its beautiful architecture, delicious food and professional sports, but, at one point in the 1960s, it was also known as a terrifying place for older women. Townsend dives deep into the Cincinnati Strangler, an unknown force of evil that killed at least seven women and harmed many more.








THE HOUSE IN THE CERULEAN SEA by T.J. Klune

Don't be shy to bring an appetite to this thrilling author talk at 7 pm on Wednesday, Aug. 20.





I want to eventually start bringing in color association with the outside world to the story times, and I made an activity box that I'm going to start bringing in, as well."

The Cold Spring Branch welcomes a new book club in August. Adult/Teen Services Programmer Danielle Heiert hosts You've Been Booked, which is open to ages 11-19. It is the perfect place to engage in interesting discussions about books from all types of genres that you help pick out!

Come and join Heiert every third Monday of the month at 3 pm starting Aug. 18. *The Kane Chronicles: The Red Pyramid* by Rick Riordan is the first book of many to be read in this book club.

We sat down with Heiert to learn more about You've Been Booked.

What was the thought process behind this book club?

Heiert: I used to have a similar book club at the middle school, but I have a lot of teens who are homeschooled that attend programs at the library. So, I really wanted to create a teen book club that was open to teens of all ages that wasn't restricted to the school they went to or if they were homeschooled.

Why do you think this is valuable?

Heiert: Book clubs are a great way to practice critical thinking and offer a place for all ages to socialize. Teens, especially, need more fun spaces outside of their school, extracurricular activities and work. I want teens to have a place to socialize and feel productive.

Also, talking about books with other people is a great way to help with reading comprehension. So even if they didn't like the book, or they struggled to read it, teens may still enjoy talking about those books with other people.

What types of books do you plan on reading and how are you picking the books?

Heiert: The kids are going to pick the books that we read! I'm going to give them an informational packet on several books—some of which I choose and others they suggest—and they get to decide which books sound most interesting to them.

What book will you be beginning the book club with?

Heiert: We're starting with *The Kane Chronicles:* The Red Pyramid by Rick Riordan. Anyone who knows me knows that I love Percy Jackson & the Olympians, and Rick Riordan is still my one of my favorite authors to this day. In the middle school book club, The Lightning Thief was always the book they kept relating everything back to. I think it's a very accessible book in general, too. So, I wanted to give them something that they may be a little familiar with but was also kind of new.

What are you most excited about?

Heiert: Teens get so excited when they talk about things that they're interested in. So, I'm really excited to see their passion for these books and reading in general. I'm excited to share my passion with them, as well.

If people are unsure if they should attend, what would you say is something about the group that is definitely worth coming for?

Heiert: I would say that if you're unsure, just try it out! If you don't enjoy it, it's totally okay. My book clubs are always open to everyone. If you want to read the book but not attend the book club or just talk to me afterward about the book, then that's also totally fine. I will say, though, that these book clubs are super fun and not formal: we're all friends there. Also, one of the things we do that I really like is starting the meetings with some Blooket trivia relating to that month's book. If they don't have a personal device to bring for this, we have some that they can use if they register for it!

Is there anything else you'd like patrons to know?

Heiert: Yes. The book club is right after school, and I know that can sometimes be difficult for transportation. So, I do have a virtual option available for anyone who's not able to come to the library for any reason. They can join the virtual meeting that I will have set up from wherever.






